


CERTIFIED THE INCIDENCE OF TEENAGE PREGNANCY Research that matters to patients

INTRODUCTION


Teenage Pregnancy refers to pregnancies in females aged 19 years and below. The World Health Organization (WHO, 2006) statistics show that annually there are 14-15 million births worldwide to teenage girls, accounting for more than 10% of births and the Ministry of Health Malaysia (MOH, 2008) statistics showed teenage pregnancy at 13%. Pregnant teenagers face obstetric, medical & social issues. Complications during pregnancy and delivery can lead to maternal death.


METHODOLOGY


This is a retrospective review based on data from the National Obstetrics Registry from 1st January 2011 to 31st December 2012. A total of 260,959 deliveries were analysed and in this study. Total number of teenagers reviewed in this study was 12,817. Teenage pregnancy was compared with pregnant women 20 years and above.

RESULTS

The ratio of teenage pregnancies was 50 per 1000 deliveries and it was similar finding for both years.









67.04% of teenage pregnancies were from the 18-19 age groups.

The majority (84%) of Teenage Pregnancy were married.

82% of teenage pregnancies delivered vaginally, while the caesarean section rates was 13.4% which was lower than general population.







Teenage pregnancy was highest at 25% among the Orang Asli in Peninsular Malaysia.

Factors associated with Teenage Pregnancy

- 65% had first trimester scan.
- 48% of teenage pregnancies were anemic at booking,
- 8% were associated with medical problems
- 0.27% were HIV positive and 0.17% had syphilis.

Complications of Teenage Pregnancy

The most frequent complications associated with teenage pregnancies was

- Preterm labor (8.2%),
- Eclampsia (6%),
- Abruptio placenta (4%).

MATERNAL AND PERINATAL MORTALITY

There were 3 maternal deaths from this group of patients. The maternal mortality ratios in this group was 23 per 100,000 deliveries which was lower compared to the overall maternal mortality at 28 per 100,000 deliveries. The perinatal mortality was 9 per 1000 live births.

DISCUSSION/CONCLUSION

The incidence of teenage pregnancy was 4.9%. This group had a lower incidence of and Caesarean section. A quarter of the patients in this group were from the ethnicity Orang Asli Peninsular Malaysia and this was probably due to their traditional customs. Teenage pregnancy predisposes to the risk of anemia and preterm delivery,
